
# Destination Carlsbad




## Carlsbad Caverns

Discover the subterranean wonderland of Carlsbad Caverns National Park, considered by many to be the Eighth Wonder of the World. The stalagmites, stalactites and flowstone began their formation from just a single drop of water some 250 million years ago. Take a guided tour that reveals the area's rich geologic history then stay to watch the Bat Flight, when thousands of bats leave the cave on their nightly foray for food (Memorial Day weekend-Labor Day weekend). Enjoy a 9.5-mile scenic drive through spectacular desert landscape and explore more

than 50 miles of primitive backcountry hiking trails. The park is one of only 20 World Heritage Sites in the U.S. Open daily except on Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's days.

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do something different Destination Carlsbad paid for by City of Carlsbad Lodgers Tax Native Americans have known about the cave for hundreds, if not thousands, of years. The Mescalero Apache called this area Jadnut?udebiga (Home of the Bat) while the Zuni Pueblo named it Asho:sti an alaluckwa (Bat Cave). If you look carefully around the cave entrance you'll find multiple mescal cooking pits and even a cave painting. The Mescalero Apache, Zuni Pueblo, and other groups were well acquainted with this piece of the Chihuahuan Desert. While there is no evidence these native peoples explored deep into the cave, they were certainly aware of its existence.

Eventually Spanish and European Americans began settling in the area. In their explorations they soon stumbled upon the gaping mouth of what is now known as Carlsbad Cavern. Several of those individuals claim to be the first to have entered the cave, but they have mostly been forgotten by history.

Our first credited cave exploration happened in the cave in 1898. Sixteen year-old cowboy, Jim White, was rounding up cattle one evening when he spotted smoke from a wildfire off in the distance. He went into high alert. Fires could be just as devastating then as they are now. He rode closer to gather information. How big was it? Was it moving guickly? What direction was it burning? These questions and more pushed Jim to ride to the fire so he could report back to camp with the most accurate information possible.

As Jim approached the smoke, he noticed something strange: he couldn't smell the smoke, hear the crackling of flames, or feel the heat of fire. Jim realized he wasn't seeing smoke. He was watching bats. Thousands-upon-thousands of Brazilian free-tailed bats. Jim finally stopped at the mouth of the cave completely mesmerized by the spectacle of flying mammals filling the air above him. He once said he watched the bats for nearly half an hour before the darkness fell so completely he had to return to camp.

Because he knew the other cowboys would mock him, Jim didn't immediately describe what he'd seen to anyone. He thought it over for several days. The deep hole in the ground and its secrets continued to gnaw at him. He had to find out what was down in the dark recesses.

Jim finally went back to the cave alone with some wire and pieces of wood. He constructed a ladder that he anchored at the mouth of the cave. It twisted and turned like a bucking bronco as Jim descended using only one hand. His other held his light source. After sixty feet, he landed on the cave floor. His light barely penetrated the cloying darkness.

At first, Jim was very uncomfortable in the cave. The names he assigned to formations give us some insight into what he was feeling when he came across new features for the first time. He named the first drip pool "Devil's Spring." That was soon followed by the "Devil's Armchair," "Devil's Den," and finally the "Witch's Finger." These features are still easily seen today as you walk down the natural entrance route. As he spent more time in the cave, Jim became more comfortable with his surroundings. His naming became more matter of fact: "The Big Room" and "Left Hand Tunnel." There were some places that sparked Jim's imagination. He named the "King's Palace" and even found a royal family in residence.

Jim's exploration of the cave continued for many years. While he investigated other caves in the area, none ever captured his imagination the same way Carlsbad Cavern did. He was its chief promoter his entire life (though supporters of Colonel Thomas Boles may beg to differ!).

Today, his legacy lives on. Every time a person leaves the cave and shares the story of his visit, he is carrying on Jim's love of this place. Every time a student researches the cave and shares her results with others, she is sharing what Jim found so awe inspiring. Carlsbad Caverns National Park owes its existence to the bats who call this place home and a young cowboy who had to know more about the dark hole that teased his imagination.

Bat Flight


Please join us for the free Bat Flight Program (late May-October), an evening ranger talk about bats prior to their flight. No reservations are required for this program that occurs every evening from Memorial Day weekend through October. The program takes place at the Bat Flight Amphitheater, located at the Natural Entrance to Carlsbad Cavern. The start time for the program changes as the summer progresses and sunset times change.

If you are here before late May, you are welcome to watch the bats exit the cavern nightly at the outdoor Bat Flight Amphitheater from the time they return from migration (usually mid-to-late April) until the Bat Flight Program begins Memorial Day weekend.


#### Guadalupe Ridge Trail

The Guadalupe Ridge Trail (GRT) is a designated National Recreation Trail and at 100 miles (161 km) long, provides hikers and backpackers with a true wilderness experience in the Chihuahuan Desert and Guadalupe Mountains. The GRT begins atop the highest point in Texas, Guadalupe Peak, located in Guadalupe Mountains National Park, winds through the Lincoln National Forest and Bureau of Land Management property, and ends at Carlsbad Caverns National Park's eastern boundary in White's City, New Mexico.

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#### Brantley i\_ake State Park

By day, Brantley Lake State Park is a popular spot for boating, canoeing, kayaking and fishing. At night, however, the focus turns to the skies, where stunning sunsets and a canopy of stars take your breath away. Located less than 20 miles from Carlsbad, this southernmost lake in New Mexico is a great spot for hiking, bird watching, picnicking and camping.

#### Sitting Bull Falls

The Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Area is a rare gem in the hot desert, this oasis offers cool pools of water and the awesome Sitting Bull Falls. Day-use area only. Pavilions, picnic tables, water, and restrooms provided. Access to many trails can be found from this site. From US285 north of Carlsbad, turn west onto NM137.

Continue on NM137 for about 20 miles until you find County Road 409. Turn right on this road and continue. The Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Site is at the end of this road.

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### Cottonwood Day Use Area

HACKBERRY SAND DUNES

This developed portion of the Black River Recreation Management Area is located south of Whites City in the area of Washington Ranch and Rattlesnake Springs. A paved trail leads visitors down a short path to a wildlife viewing deck along the river's edge. The area, well known as a diverse bird habitat, offers picnic facilities, a vault toilet, and three primitive hiking trails. All are rated easy.

Dam Trail - The trailhead is located on the west side of the parking area and follows a two-track road to a small concrete dam on the Black River. This 1.5 mile round trip takes about  $1 - 1 \frac{1}{4}$  hours.

#### Hackberry i\_ake OHV Area

Carlsbad Field Office (CFO) has two areas designated for Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) use: Alkali Lake, east of Illinois Camp Road and Hackberry Lake OHV Areas off of Shugart Road (Hwy 222). Each area provides opportunity for diverse recreation experiences. Alkali Lake OHV site has trails consisting of sand, limestone hills, and draws, giving the rider a variety of skill testing opportunities. Hackberry Lake has two distinct environments - a large, open sand dune complex and an extensive trail area. The 132-acre dune area provides the OHV rider with 30-40 foot red sand dunes on which to test their skills. Just a short distance from the dunes is the trail area where the Carlsbad Desert 100 Race is held each year. This Hackberry Lake OHV site has nearly 100 miles of trails through sandy desert terrain and rocky, rolling hills. Both Hackberry sites allow free overnight camping and are developed with sheltered picnic areas, a vault toilet and large, graveled parking lots.

#### Carlsbad Museum

With exhibits devoted to early Native American pottery, textiles and artifacts as well as paintings by acclaimed New Mexico artists of the early 20th century, the Carlsbad Museum has long been considered the jewel of Carlsbad. Opened in 1931, it's the oldest municipal museum in New Mexico, with permanent exhibits devoted to local, regional and Southwest history. The museum also hosts special exhibits and events, and has a gift shop full of jewelry, art posters, books relating to the Southwest, and more.

### Flume

The Pecos River Flume is an aqueduct over the Pecos River in Carlsbad, New Mexico. It was originally constructed of wood in 1890 as part of the Southern Main Canal to carry irrigation water to dry areas from Lake Avalon. Pecos River-originated water flows through the flume, which once led "Ripley's Believe It or Not" to feature it as "the world's only river that crosses itself."

The Pecos River Flume is located off Callaway Drive on Westridge Drive. It is about one block northeast of U.S. Highway 285.

#### Heritage Park

Located on Callaway Drive on the south side of the Pecos River, this historical park contains the first homestead built in the County of Eddy, The Eddy House. There is a covered picnic shelter where an annual event is held honoring the pioneer families of Carlsbad and surrounding areas.

## Culture

#### Veterans Park

The Veterans Memorial Park Committee was established late 2009 by Carlsbad city ordinance. The responsibility of the Committee is to plan, design, and build a memorial park for all Carlsbad veterans who have honorably served.

Up on the crest of the hill north of the walkway, major monuments are standing above ground. The first monument installed commemorates the Vietnam Veterans from Carlsbad. We have 12 veterans from Carlsbad KIA in Vietnam; their names are on the Vietnam Wall in Washington DC. The monument is a 4 square of black granite on a base. The DOD information on the Virtual Wall website as well as the photo of the veteran is laser etched onto the black granite stone. This is a stunning monument for our veterans.

We also have a large polished black granite monument honoring Bataan Veterans. 135 Eddy County Veterans were on Bataan. A granite stone etched with the 135 names will be installed in front of the Bataan Monument, September 2013.

Two sculptures of Korea War Soldiers on patrol grace the area between the Bataan (WWII) and Vietnam War monuments forming a chronological line of defenders of our nation.

An arc of War Monuments backed by an arc of Service Flags flying above the War Monuments stand majestically to the east of the Bataan monument. Out front and center of the monuments is a M42 "Duster" up on a 4' pedestal, a centerpiece of the Park. Many Carlsbad Army National Guard Soldiers trained and served on the Duster.

## Living Desert Zoo & Gardens


